These can may have been compiled by religious organisations and are still in their custody, or they may be held in local archives or libraries Example shown:

• Cemetery Records

Contact the cemetery owner or local authority to find out where these are kept

Monumental Inscriptions

Learn more about your deceased relative by reading who they remembered in their will, what property they owned, and where they lived.

Family Papers

Letters, diaries, journals, newspaper clippings, funeral programmes, and a host of other ephemera can be found in your own home – or ask around the family to see who else has some!

Newspaper Announcements

Obituaries, death announcements, and funeral notices can be found in newspapers held by local libraries, on family announcement websites, and newspaper databases
