

Helping Others Get Started with Family History Research Process - Find

LESSON OVERVIEW

After you gather known information and chose a research goal, the next step in the research process is to use records to find **new** information to help meet your research goal. Searching for and finding records are cornerstones of family history research.

Records contain information that verifies existing data about your ancestors.

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 Records contain new information that can help meet your research goal.
- Records can contain information that conflicts with known information. When you resolve the conflict, you can open additional possibilities for research.
- Records can contain clues that point to other records that you can search to meet your research goal.

- 1. Review the research goal you chose earlier. What records could help meet that research goal?
- 2. Which jurisdictions hold those records?
