What is Guided Research?

- Prioritized Databases: The most comprehensive and complete databases were
 determined by FamilySearch genealogists for optimized research and are displayed first
 to the researcher. This is especially helpful in countries where there are multiple
 databases available on different genealogy websites.
- **Birth, Marriage and Death info:** The experience focuses on finding birth, marriage, and death information by locality.
- Online Databases and Images: Links to both free and subscription genealogy websites are provided for complete coverage of possible databases.
- What Else You Can Try pages: The What Else You Can Try Wiki pages for each locality provides tips for problem solving if the initial result proves unsuccessful. These pages cover information regarding the lack and loss of records for the locality, substitute records available, and tips for better search results.
- **Easy to Use:** Clear and concise presentation helps in navigating the experience and getting to the information you need quickly.

Who is Guided Research for?

Guided Research was created especially for those who already have some research
experience under their belts and are starting research in an unfamiliar location. But we
welcome anyone who wants to give it a try!

- On the FamilySearch Research Wiki (which can be accessed by going to wiki.familysearch.org, or by going to FamilySearch, clicking the "Search" dropdown, and selecting "Research Wiki")

What else you can try:

 - Databases listed in Guided Research include any website that has relevant records, including "major" websites like FamilySearch.org, Ancestry.com, Findmypast, MyHeritage, etc. as well as smaller, local state/county websites.
 - If your searches in those databases are unsuccessful, use the "What else you can try" section for more research ideas.

What Else You Can Try

- Additional Online Resources: This section provides other collections/databases/websites with relevant records that weren't the highest in prioritization but could still be useful in researching. It also will include browsable image collections, where applicable.
- **Substitute Records:** This section will give other record types that could provide vital information, in the case of unsuccessful vital record searching.
- Improve Searching: This section gives suggestions for ways to manipulate and enhance your search techniques in indexed collections to improve search results.
- Why the Record may not Exist: This section includes information about relevant record loss or date coverage in online collections that may explain some searching problems.
