This session aims to reveal the importance of the spiritual, physical and emotional journey taken by early converts to the restored gospel of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, who travelled from Liverpool to the USA. A variety of useful records and resources will be given, to aid looking for ancestors emigrating from the UK to the USA to follow their faith, alongside inferences that can be made from DNA testing and collaborating with matches.



The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints was formally organised in America on 6 April 1830

- Joseph Smith (23 December, 1805 27 June, 1844)
- Church members went to Great Britain in 1830s to preach the message of the Restored Gospel

Liverpool

- city in northwest England, located where the River Mersey meets the Irish Sea
- a key trade and migration port from the 18th to early 20th centuries
- Liverpool seen as the 'qateway' for introducing the Restored Gospel in Great Britain
- 19 July 1837 7 missionaries arrived on board the Garrick

52 Bold Street

the meeting place for the Saints in the early 19th century, the city's Music Hall - 52 Bold Street, is still in use, although commercially

- Elder John Taylor was the first to preach the restored gospel in Liverpool from July 1840 there
- it is the city's only remaining building from the mid-19th century that was used by the early Church members in England
- between 1840 1860, tens of thousands of Latter-day Saints embarked from the Liverpool docks on ships that carried them from their homeland to gather with other members in the United States

The "Three Graces"

On the waterfront now, the iconic mercantile buildings known as the Three Graces - on the Pier Head:

- Royal Liver Building
- Cunard Building
- Port of Liverpool Building

Between 1840 and 1860, tens of thousands of Latter-day Saints embarked from the Liverpool docks on ships that carried them from their homeland to gather with other members in the United States.

Provisions


The cost of crossing the Atlantic was £3 to £5 per adult. British law required that the fare include for each adult passenger passengers were free to add any extra food they would need:

- 33 pounds bread
- 10 pounds rice
- 10 pounds oatmeal
- 10 pounds flour
- 10 pounds peas and beans
- 35 pounds potatoes
- 10 Pounds pork
- 60 gallons water
- 1 pint vinegar
